From the Director's Desk – *The Rights of the Reader: The Right to Skip*

Skipping is okay when you're reading. Many may disagree with that statement. After all, you can't skip ahead in line, and you can't eat your dessert first.

When you go to a movie or a concert, the quality of your experience is largely controlled by the performer or the director of the movie. You can't really not listen to only part of the concert or not watch the parts of the movie you dislike. You can't skip ahead in a concert or a movie. Reading is different.

When I was in college I had a professor who, in response to complaints about the size of his assigned reading list, said it was necessary to learn to read discriminately, or to learn to skip.

With all due respect to authors, not every word is of equal importance. Nor are all words equally appealing. Learning which words are more or less important, or which words we like and which ones we don't, is an essential part of reading.

Making choices about what we read, or skipping, makes reading our own experience. And that is the great thing about reading.

We can control the experience of reading. We create our own unique experiences when we read.

So go ahead and skip when you're reading. It's part of the experience!

New for You: Research Tools

Two useful new resources are now available through the library's web site — **Pronunciator**, a language-learning service, and **World Vital Records**, a resource for genealogy research.

Pronunciator is the most comprehensive language-learning service available. It offers 80 foreign languages;

ESL for 50 non-English languages; and full-featured apps for all Android and Apple devices. Pronunciator meets the needs of all users, from kids to seniors.

World Vital Records is a user-friendly genealogy resource. It is an offshoot of Ancestry.com and can be accessed from home. Access billions of names

in family history record collections worldwide. It includes US and UK censuses and much more, and is especially suitable for those who do not have much information at hand.

Look for the new resources on the library's web site, under "Research Tools."

April is Autism Awareness Month

National Autism Awareness Month is recognized each year during the month of April to highlight the growing need for concern and awareness about Autism Spectrum Disorder. Numbers vary, but as many as one in 50, to one in 88, children are affected by autism. The chance that you know someone with autism is high. That is why it is very important to understand what autism is.

Autism is defined in *The American Heritage Stedman's Medical Dictionary* as "a pervasive developmental disorder characterized by severe deficits in social interaction and communication; by an extremely limited range of activities and interests; and often by the presence of repetitive, stereotyped behaviors."

One of the best ways to learn about autism is to read about it. Below are some books available at the library:

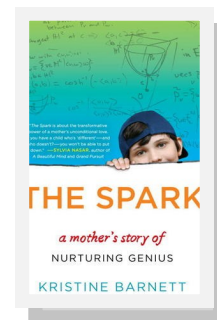
Now children may

Tuesday, May 6 at 6:30 PM

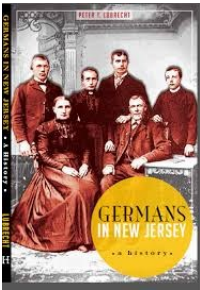
Pruning Ornamental Shrubs & Trees

Saturday, May 17 at 1:30 PM

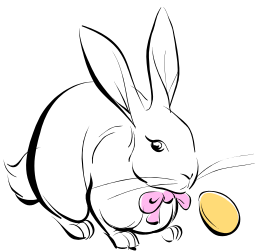
Celestial Conversations: Healing Grief and Relationships after Death
