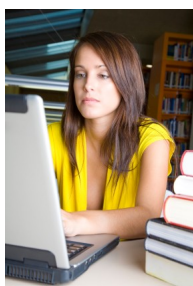

From the Director's Desk: Jeffersonlibrary.net—the new edition

Each time the library redesigns its website a new chapter in the library's story begins. Our very first website was homemade, and hosted on a free server. Back then our goal was to establish a place on the internet where people could find information about the library.

The second version of our website was intended to make many of the library's services available remotely. We knew that more people would use the library if they could use our services from a home computer.

At the end of May we will unveil the third edition of the website. Library staff members Sandy Cale and

Christine O'Brien have worked with Wolf von Bistram, our web designer and the manager of our website, on a redesign of the library website. Our goals for the redesign were to make the site accessible from tablet computers and smart phones, and to make it easier to find certain sections of the site. Previously if a person visited the library website using a tablet computer or a smart phone, many of its features could not be used. Also, if a person wanted to go to the library catalog or download material, they had to go three to four screens into the site. The redesigned site addresses both of these problems.

With this new edition of our website the library acknowledges that many

people are forsaking their laptop and desktop computers for smaller, portable multipurpose devices. Now the library can go with you! So this summer if you are at the beach and you spy the person next to you reading an interesting book, you can easily use your smart phone or tablet computer to see if the library has that book. You may even be able to download an e-book or audio edition of the book without ever leaving your blanket!

Databases: What & Why?

Organized and updated collections of data, databases are often the best and most direct way to find information such as magazine articles on a specific topic, genealogy information, and current company profiles.

You can use library databases, including Ebsco Periodicals, The New York Times Historical Newspapers, ERIC and Reference USA, at the library or from your home computer. One exception is The Ancestry Library, which is only available at the library.

Visit www.jeffersonlibrary.net and select *Research Tools* for a drop down list of currently available databases.

Rather than surfing the web and retrieving lots of irrelevant information, try using a database. You'll find that doing so often saves you a lot of time, and provides you with exactly the information you're looking for.

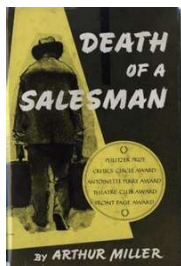

Classic Corner: *Death of a Salesman*

The ultimate tale of the low man on the totem pole, *Death of a Salesman* is the story of the little guy, Willie Loman (low man, get it?), who never really gets his piece of the rock.

After years of hard work as a stockings salesman, the

aging Loman takes stock of his life and realizes he has never amounted to anything. "He had the wrong dreams," another character observes. It is this that Loman realizes too late, after years of toiling with misguided goals and causing irreparable damage

to his family.

So when you drag your workworn body through the front door, feeling like a beaten-down Willie Loman, you may want to ask yourself what your dreams are.

Are they the right dreams?

Red, White & Blue Reading: America, Patriots and Patriotism

Breen, T. H. **American Insurgents, American Patriots: The Revolution of the People**

Before there could be a revolution, there was a rebellion; before patriots, there were insurgents. Challenging and displacing decades of received wisdom, this original book explains how ordinary Americans—most of them members of farm families living in small communities—were drawn into a successful insurgency against imperial authority. Breen is the William Smith Mason Professor of American History and director of the Chabreja Center for Historical Studies at Northwestern University.

Burrows, Edwin G. **Forgotten Patriots: The Untold Story of American Prisoners During the Revolutionary War**

Between 1775 and 1783, some 200,000 Americans took up arms against the British Crown, and about 25,000 became prisoners of

war. In the British prison ships of New York, captives were chronically underfed, while multitudes died of disease in fetid, cramped cells. Evidence suggests that as many as 18,000 Americans died while incarcerated, more than twice as many as died on the battlefield. Drawing on a vast array of diaries, personal narratives, and private correspondence, Pulitzer Prizewinning historian Edwin G. Burrows offers the first complete history of this ghastly and unacknowledged tragedy of the American Revolution.

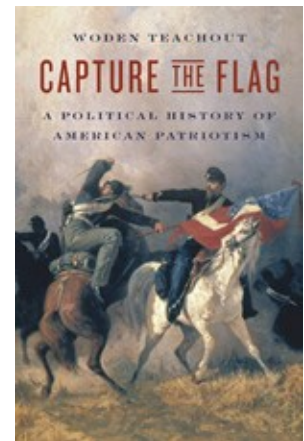
Kennedy, Caroline. **A Patriots Handbook: Songs, Poems, Stories, and Speeches Celebrating the Land We Love**

When John F. Kennedy called America "the land we love" more than 42 years ago, he was reminding us of the lofty ideals on which our country was founded. But what are those ideals, and

how have Americans defined them? The America you meet on these pages is one that derives its strength from its diversity. Caroline Kennedy is an author and editor, head of the Office of Strategic Partnerships for the New York City Department of Education, and president of the John F. Kennedy Foundation.

Teachout, Woden. **Capture the Flag: A Political History of American Patriotism**

Americans honor the flag with a fervor seen in few other countries. But what does the flag mean? Historian Teachout reveals that it has held vastly different meanings over time. In tracing the political history of the flag from its origins in the American Revolution through the present day, he demonstrates that the shifting symbolism of the flag reveals a broader shift in the definition of American patriotism.
